1. Heir of Thatcher. Farage was a member of the Conservative Party until 1992. His hero is none other than Margaret Thatcher.

2. On the Gravy Train. As an MEP Farage grabs a salary of £79,000 a year, and claims £250 per day every time he turns up to the European parliament.

On top of this he claims an office allowance of around £42,600 a year. He likes to keep his expenses in the family – Farage employs his wife on a salary of £30,000 a year.

3. A banker. Farage is an ex-public school boy and made his fortune as a banker in the City of London.

4. Expenses scandal. In 2009 Farage was embroiled in an expenses scandal after the Guardian reported how he had received a total of £2 million of taxpayers' money in staff, travel and other expenses.

5. Sexism. Nigel Farage said women with children were “worth less” than men in the financial sector.

6. LGBT rights. Farage told a radio reporter, “I do not support the idea of same-sex marriages”.

7. Migrant-hater. Farage hates migrants so much he said he would “prioritise lower economic growth and a poorer Britain over an increase in migrants in the UK”.

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
